

## Cornell Seniors' Participation in Engaged Learning: Results from the 2018 Senior Survey August 2018

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Every two years, Cornell asks graduating seniors to participate in the Senior Survey. Since 2012, the survey has asked seniors whether they participated in various forms of engaged learning during their time at Cornell including research, internship, service, and international experiences. This report shows trend data on engaged learning participation for survey respondents as a whole, and breakouts by seniors' gender identity, race/ethnicity, first generation status, financial aid receipt, and undergraduate college for 2018 results.

Response rates on the Senior Survey have ranged from 46% to 44% over this time period. We caution that we do not know whether engaged learning participation among seniors who chose <u>not</u> to complete these surveys differs significantly from that of survey respondents. Further, Cornell alternates between conducting a local "Cornell" version of the Senior Survey and a common "COFHE" survey instrument used by peer institutions. The wording of engaged learning items varies between these instruments (see comparison on last page). Both versions produce comparable participation rates for most forms of engaged learning, but item wording differences appear to account for observed declines in participation in service activities.

The main takeaways concerning seniors' participation in engaged learning are:

- The vast majority of Cornell seniors have participated in some form of engaged learning (e.g., 97% in 2018). This rate of engagement has been quite consistent since 2012.
- The percentage of seniors participating in internships in the U.S. and in a research experience (particularly in something "other" than research with faculty) has inched up over this time period.
- Conversely, seniors' participation in some form of international experience has declined in the most recent survey; this decline is evident across all forms of international experiences included in the survey.
- While the percentage of Class of 2018 seniors who reported participating in service experiences is substantively lower than that reported by earlier classes (i.e. 53% in 2018 versus 67% in 2016), this drop appears to stem from differences in item wording across survey years.
- Participation in engaged learning varies significantly across the undergraduate colleges and, less consistently, by seniors' demographic characteristics.

Future analyses will use regression methods to better understand the factors associated with higher or lower rates of engaged learning participation, and to examine the connections between various forms of engaged learning and student outcomes.




Fig 1. Percent of Cornell seniors reporting an engaged learning experience as an undergraduate, by Senior Survey year




Fig 2. Percent of Cornell seniors reporting an internship as an undergraduate, by Senior Survey year






Fig 3a. Percent of Cornell seniors reporting a service experience\* as an undergraduate, by Senior Survey year





Note: Using split samples, Cornell conducted Cornell and COFHE versions of the Senior Survey in 2014.

The largest difference in measures of service experiences between the Cornell and COFHE versions of the Senior Survey concerns service that was done on a voluntary basis, without being required academically. Cornell Senior Surveys conducted in 2012, 2014 and 2016 use these definitions: participation in "community service in the U.S." and "community service outside the U.S." that was "not for academic credit or to fulfill a requirement." The COFHE Senior Surveys conducted in 2014 and 2018 use these definitions: "volunteer service in the U.S." and "volunteer service abroad." It is clear from comparing results from the Cornell and COFHE surveys conducted in 2014 that the Cornell term *community service* captures a broader range of voluntary service experiences within the U.S. than does the COFHE term *volunteer service*. Figure 3b also demonstrates that the declines in "any service" participation, particularly *volunteer or non-credit community service*, seen in the 2014 and 2018 COFHE survey results appear to be an artifact of survey wording variations rather than a reflection of true differences in service engagement.




Fig 4. Percent of Cornell seniors reporting a research experience as an undergraduate, by Senior Survey year




Fig 5. Percent of Cornell seniors reporting an international experience as an undergraduate, by Senior Survey year

Note: With the exception of community-based research questions, all Cornell survey measures asked students to report separately on engagement done "for academic credit or to fulfill a requirement" and those done "not for academic credit or to fulfill a requirement." The COFHE survey does not make this distinction in credit/non-credit engagement.
