#### ETHNICITY AND RACE: INSTITUTIONAL REPORTING

Consistent with practices established by the federal government and in use across high education, the following reporting framework counts each student within a single category. Based on these categories,

- 13.4% identify themselves as under-represented minorities (URM). URM is defined as American Indian (U.S.), Black (U.S), Hawaiian/Pacific Isle (U.S.) or any combination including one or more of these categories. All students of Hispanic ethnicity, regardless of race, are also considered URM.
- **37.0**% identify themselves as **students of color.** This group includes URM plus Asian (U.S.) and Multi Race, non-URM (U.S.).
